



Lesson Plan: Build Your Own Church

Target Audience: Multiple ages (adapt activities and discussions as needed) Time: 60 minutes Materials: "Build Your Own Church" brick-set (with a variety of bricks and elements), Bibles (age-appropriate), whiteboard or chart paper, markers, optional: pictures of different churches, building blocks for "Strong Foundation" game

Learning Objectives:

Cognitive Objectives (Knowledge and Understanding):

All Ages:

- o Identify different parts of a church building (e.g., steeple, doors, windows).
- Understand that a church is more than just a building; it's a place for people to gather and worship God.
- Recall a story from the Bible that took place in a church or temple (e.g., Jesus teaching in the temple, Paul preaching).
- Recognise that everyone can contribute to building a strong church community.

• Older Children:

- Explain what makes a church special and important to them.
- Describe ways they can help build up the church community (e.g., being kind, helping others, participating).
- Connect the idea of building a church to building a strong and welcoming church community.

Affective Objectives (Attitudes and Values):

All Ages:

- Appreciate the importance of the church as a place of worship, learning, and community.
- Demonstrate a willingness to participate in church activities and contribute to the community.

 Express their feelings about church and their role in it in a safe and respectful environment.

• Older Children:

- Reflect on how they can be active and responsible members of the church.
- Consider the importance of including everyone in the church community.
- Value the diversity of gifts and talents within the church.

Psychomotor Objectives (Skills):

All Ages:

- Participate actively in the lesson activities and discussions.
- Collaborate with others to design and build a church.
- Communicate their ideas and thoughts effectively.
- Practice problem-solving and creative thinking skills.

• Older Children:

- Engage in role-playing scenarios to practice welcoming new people to the church.
- Create a drawing or story about their ideal church community.
- Apply the concepts of the lesson to real-life situations within the church.

Remember to:

- Adapt these objectives to the specific needs and abilities of your students.
- Clearly communicate the learning objectives to the children at the beginning of the lesson.
- Use a variety of assessment methods to evaluate whether the objectives have been met (e.g., observation, discussion, creative expression).

Lesson Procedure:

Introduction and Check-In (10 minutes)

- **Welcome:** Greet the children enthusiastically and create a welcoming atmosphere.
- **Opening Prayer:** Begin with a short prayer, thanking God for the church and the people in it.

• Icebreaker/Check-In:

- Younger Children: Sing a song about church or building. Ask, "What is your favorite thing about church?"
- Older Children: Start with a quick discussion: "If you could design your dream church, what would it have?"
- Introduce the Theme: Show the "Build Your Own Church" set and explain that they
 will be working together to create their own church. Introduce the theme "Building
 God's House Together."

Social Communication & Main Task (25 minutes)

- **Collaborative Building:** Divide the children into small groups (mixed ages if possible) and give each group a pile of building-bricks.
- Facilitate Collaboration:
 - Younger Children: Encourage them to build freely, focusing on teamwork and sharing ideas.
 - **Older Children:** Challenge them to think about the different parts of a church and how they can work together to create a complete model.
- **Observe and Support:** Circulate, offering guidance and encouragement. Highlight examples of good communication, problem-solving, and creativity.

Biblical Learning (15 minutes)

Church Building:

- "What are some important parts of a church?" (steeple, cross, doors, windows, etc.)
- "Why do we have churches?" (to worship God, learn about the Bible, be together with other Christians)
- "How is our brick-church like a real church?" (a place to gather, learn, and grow in faith)

Church Community:

- "Who are the people who make up a church?" (pastors, teachers, friends, families)
- "How can we make our church a welcoming place for everyone?" (be kind, helpful, include others)
- "How are the bricks like the people in our church?" (different shapes and sizes, but all important for building something strong)

• Explore Bible Connections:

- Younger Children: Share a simple story about Jesus in the temple or another story that takes place in a church setting.
- Older Children: Discuss the importance of the church in the New Testament (e.g., Acts 2:42-47 – the early church).

• Interactive Activity:

 "Strong Foundation" Game: (Optional) Have the children take turns adding a block to a tower, saying something that makes the church strong (prayer, love, kindness, helping others).

Evaluations and Reflections (5 minutes)

• Discussion:

- Younger Children:
 - "What did you like best about building our church?"
 - "How can you be a good helper at church?"

Older Children:

- "How can we make our church even better?"
- "What are some ways you can use your talents to help the church?"

• Creative Expression: (Optional)

- Have the children draw a picture of their favorite part of church or their brick-creation.
- Encourage them to write or tell a story about a time they felt welcomed at church.

Plenary and Finish (5 minutes)

- Review Key Concepts: Briefly summarise the main points of the lesson.
- **Closing Prayer:** End with a prayer, thanking God for the church and asking for help to be good church members.
- **Take-Home Activity:** (Optional) Provide a simple activity or coloring page related to church for the children to complete at home.

Adaptations:

- Younger Children: Use simpler language, shorter activities, and more visual aids.
- Older Children: Encourage deeper discussions, more complex activities, and connections to real-life situations.
- **Time:** Adjust the time allocated to each phase based on the needs and engagement of your students.

This lesson plan provides a framework for your "Build Your Own Church" Sunday school lesson. Remember to be flexible, adapt to your students' needs, and most importantly, create a fun and engaging learning experience that helps them understand the importance of church and their role in the community!
